Who is eligible?

- Enrolled in Washington State Developmental Disabilities Administration (DDA)
- Enrolled in Washington State Division of Vocational Rehabilitation (DVR).
- School-to-Work accepts students regardless of level of disability.
- Wants to work in the community
- Last year of transition (Age 21)
 - * Some younger students per Agreements with School Districts.
- Enrolled in a school district within King County or a partnering County.
- Student must apply for benefits through the **Social Security** Administration (SSA).
- Able to obtain Medicaid or other long term funding.
